The second One Voice choir concert brought together all eight schools from across Northern Lights Learning Trust for a memorable evening of entertainment at Venerable Bede CE Academy.

Nearly 200 young performers, supported by a live band, showcased their talent along with two staff bands from the trust's two secondary schools, Venerable Bede and Ian Ramsey CE academies.

Additionally, accomplished pianists from Venerable Bede performed and Jess Dale (below), a teaching assistant from Benedict Biscop, wowed the audience with her rendition of Whitney Houston's "I Will Always Love You."





The concert, organised by Marie Crowe, head of school at Hart Primary, and Ruth Bonner, head of music at Venerable Bede, concluded with a well-deserved standing ovation from the 400-strong audience.

Chief executive Jo Heaton expressed her immense pride in the talent displayed from across the trust. She said: "What a special event that showed our unity, our strength together across all our schools and how we provide opportunities for our children and young people to be part of and experience.

"I'm so proud and so thankful to everyone who was there or worked towards this event - 'shining stronger together' and one wonderful voice."

Writing after the performance, one parent contacted the trust to say how much the concert had boosted their child's confidence. "She came out of the event on cloud nine, full of inspiration and can't wait for next year's already. We can't thank staff enough – you are amazing!" said the parent.

With the success of this year's One Voice, plans are already underway for next year's performance, promising an even bigger and better show.





'Outstanding' presentation wins £3,000 for St Helen's playground in Dragon's Den showdown

It was like TV's Dragon's Den – and children from St Helen's Primary School won over a grilling from the Teesside University panel and came away with funding worth £3,000.

The money will pay for a circular running track marked out on the playground plus pedal bikes, scooters, balance bikes, skateboards and helmets.

The school's journey with the Creating Active Schools Project started five months ago. The initiative looks at how active your school is and, along with some help from the project managers, they work alongside school staff to increase physical activity.

Six pupils went around each class to tell the children the ideas they had created and asked each child to vote for their favourite. A presentation was then prepared on the most popular idea – the circular running track.

"We went to Teesside University to present our idea to the four 'dragons'," said headteacher Marcus Newing. "The presentation was absolutely outstanding. The pupils spoke with confidence and a real belief that their idea would have a big impact on St Helen's Primary School pupils.

"The dragons loved it and generously agreed to fund the whole project."

Secondaries learn horrors of the holocaust, Anne Frank inspiration

Twenty Year 8 pupils at Venerable Bede CE Academy became tour guides for an Anne Frank and World War II holocaust exhibition at the school.

They presented to Year 7 and their Year 8 peers the story of the remarkable German-born Jewish girl, who kept a diary in which she documented life in hiding under Nazi persecution during the German occupation of the Netherlands.

The school hosted a morning for the local community and churches, with more than 50 people attending. Among the visitors was Tony Wortman, of the Jewish community, who spoke after the tours had taken place.

Parents and carers attended a separate evening event.

"The pupils were a credit to the school," said Mrs Rebecca Scott, head of history at Venerable Bede. "I was amazed by their knowledge and how they grew in confidence over the two weeks. Each and every one of them should be so proud of themselves."

Venerable Bede CE Academy pupils were presented with special certificates and now have the opportunity to become ambassadors of the Anne Frank Trust, taking part in events and visiting key historical sites such as Auschwitz and Anne Frank's house.
