#### Amazon boost for St Aidan's

The engineering team later provided workshops for pupils to see how they check and repair the robotics used in the factory. St Aidan's has now been invited to take part in the Amazon twinning project – a further chance to allow more pupils to experience a broader range of careers that the company can offer in the future through further visits to the factory, virtual resources and in-school presentations and workshops.

As part of the project, Amazon has donated £10,000 to be put towards resources and experiences linked to careers projects.

#### Keeping children active is essential: Headteacher's message to Parliament

Iain Williamson, Headteacher at Dame Dorothy Primary School, has taken part in a round table event in Parliament to share his expertise about how we increase children's participation in physical activity.

Iain shared lots of the pioneering work being done at Dame Dorothy.

Through my ongoing involvement with Youth Sport Trust, I was invited to Westminster by Leigh Ingham, MP for Stafford, to discuss the decline in PE and activity for our young people and to look at possible solutions. The meeting was attended by three MPs, officials from the FA, Sport England, Ali Oliver, the CEO of Youth Sports Trust, CEOs of **MATs and government** policy makers.

"The consensus from the group readily acknowledged that



childhood activity is decreasing and that this is negatively impacting the mental health of young people. The group debated potential solutions to breaking these barriers to inactivity in school and a large part of the discussions focussed upon our active uniform initiative at Dame Dorothy.

"It was pleasing to note that our uniform change (to sportswear) was very well received by the MPs who were keen to understand the reasons why and the benefits that it has brought. In fact, a significant part of the meeting was spent discussing how this could make a difference to activity in every school.

"Hopefully, there will be a follow up and a continuation to this debate in the coming months and a genuine attempt to take action to improve the health and well-being of children throughout the country."

Jo Heaton, Chief Executive, said: "We are very proud of Iain and it is great to see him representing Northern Lights on a national level and sharing his expertise."

# Andrew's ultra-marathon for charity inspired by Sophia

An Assistant Headteacher at Grange Primary School has run 127 miles in 29 hours to raise almost £3,000 for the Children's Cancer North charity.

Andrew Beane's ultra marathon – the furthest the keen runner has travelled in a single session – was inspired by a Grange pupil, Sophia, who was diagnosed with cancer in November last year. Sophia's positivity and infectious smile helped Andrew cover 100 laps of the estate around his home.

Sophia has now received the news that she is cancer free.

Andrew's aim was to raise money that the charity could use to make children's time in hospital as comfortable as possible.

Children's Cancer North is dedicated to making life better for children with



cancer across the North East and Cumbria. Around 100 children from across the region are newly diagnosed

with cancer every year and attend the Great North Children's Hospital in Newcastle for their treatment.

#### The 'Brilliant Club' inspires Year 10s to consider Oxford

Throughout this term a group of Year 10 pupils at St Aidan's CE Academy have been working through the "Brilliant Club" scholars programme – an academic initiative that helps pupils develop university-style thinking and skills through intensive learning experiences.

As part of the programme, pupils worked with a PhD tutor on a university-level topic, attended weekly tutorials and completed a final assignment that is marked using university-style grading. Within this programme, pupils also had the exciting opportunity to visit the University of Oxford where they toured historic colleges, engaged in academic workshops and gained a first-hand insight into life at a top university. It was an inspiring experience that aimed to broaden their aspirations for higher education.

Pupils' conduct, effort, engagement and hard work was exceptional throughout the programme and is evident through the positive feedback received from individuals at the Brilliant Club who were glowing in their reviews. All of the pupils involved will be attending a formal graduation event later in July.
